## **EDITORIAL**

In countries where an ecological disaster has happened, in warring countries or in countries which are under occupation as in the West Bank, unfortunately often the way international aid is dispensed months or years after the general situation is stabilized, is not quite up to expectations. This worries us sometimes, and once more, because of the mentality of "every man for himself", showed us the limits of such help to reach the fixed targets.

Ideally this aid should be sustained by a strategic plan which is agreed on by the different local and international governmental and nongovernmental NGO's and conducted by a real will to work together in spite of different especially political but also religious or philosophical motivations, otherwise the benefit for local people will be limited. To the contrary, if there is not a common agreement it can lead to tensions between the different aid dispensers on the field and increase dramatically the expenses without proportional benefit for the local community. In the last years, my experience in Africa and India and now in the

Holy Land showed me that unfortunately often different NGO's ,governmental as well as religious institutions always tried to take all the credit of international aid for themselves at the expense of reduplication of the same services, especially in the health sector. We greatly regret that in this field mentalities have not changed for decades in spite of some improvements due for most part to individuals. Working together doesn't and should not distort the image of each NGO or institution. In this complex world of "charity business" it is not only the good thoughts that count but the ability to achieve the best possible results.

Let us stay open-minded and work for an apolitical and interfaith movement whose aim should be to help those who are in need. Institutions that threat patients with true respect, recognize their dignity, attend to their spiritual needs, value people over technology and value service over the bottom line should work in symbiosis. All together we should strive towards this aim especially in the Holy Land.
