EDITORIAL

The Holy Land, the Promised Land, the Land where "milk and honey is flowing"; in the Bible, these are some different ways referring to this country in the Middle East where Holy Family Hospital is located.

For us Christians, this land was chosen by God for His incarnation and for the salvation of humanity.

In fact, in spite of this idyllic description, since ancient times, this land has been an object of everyone's desire, a land promised to confrontations, to expression of the most violent feelings and evil which deeply affect one's relations with his neighbors and with God.

When desire changes into eagerness, when the need to satisfy oneself becomes a priority, the human being becomes a predator of his fellow creatures. In this case how could one see a brother in his neighbor, how could one live in peace with foreigners?

Is it not time to ask ourselves how we can overcome this cycle of violence? Are we aware enough of the role we could play in inviting one's to think, posing questions and opening new horizons?

Does finding hope mean to find wisdom? If yes, which kind of hope and which kind of wis-

dom? The wise man doesn't stop! to question himself knowing that his answers are limited and partial; therefore he always raises new questions, knowing that the answers of others and the trust in the plans of God will open new paths for him to overcome this violence. But, are there still wise men in this country and if yes, which kind of impact can they exercise on the elaboration of a peace process for this country? Doesn't wisdom consist of avoiding deadlocks, first of all violence? Therefore, as a matter of priority, one has to cultivate justice first and then go to fraternity and blossoming of human beings. Is this not the plan of God? Asking ourselves these questions mean to take the first step towards the abandonment of violence and desire. It depends on us to prefer the covenant over violence and what it creates: fear and envy.

The concern for the well-being of one's neighbor, the self-denial and the faith in God's plan are a rampart for life but also a promise of growth and blossoming and thus a ferment of hope and peace for this country.
