"Find support for young Christians"

EDITORIAL

As Christian and CEO of a Christian institution, living in Bethlehem is a permanent challenge, either being a matter how to give the best care to pregnant women and their baby and to train Palestinian doctors properly or being a matter of knowing the complicated geopolitical stakes of this country. This of course seems to be very exciting, but sometimes it is in fact also depressing.

I would like to share with you this month some remarks and statistics concerning the Palestinian Christian population.

Palestinian Christians comprise only 1.37 % of the Palestinian population in the West Bank/Gaza/East Jerusalem while the percentage in Israel it is 1.66%. In comparison to other countries in the Middle East like Lebanon (30%) and Egypt (10%) the percentage of Christians living in the Holy Land is low.

Regarding Christian localities, Bethlehem Governorate is home to 43.4% of all Christians, Ramal-Iah Governorate 24.7% and Jerusalem 17.9%. Since 2001, according to the presidential decree on the appointment of head of local council in main Christian localities, ten municipalities and village councils in Palestine have to appoint or elect a Christian member to head their local council in spite of the fact that sometimes the Christians are a minority in some of these localities. Another presidential decree listed 13 ministers, 2 of which should

be Christians.

Nevertheless the percentage of Palestinian Christians has been declining since the mid-fifties of the last century. The main reason and driving force for this emigration is the lack of freedom and security. followed by the deterioration of the economic situation. Few job opportunities, dire economic situation, closures and separation walls and fences that prevent the villagers from accessing the cities, are other reasons for emigration. In 2006, forty five thousand Palestinians had applied to diplomatic foreign representatives for immigration, most of whom were either highly educated or businessmen. This massively affects the level of economy and education amongst the Muslims and Christians in Palestine. Bethlehem Governorate ranks first for the highest Christian popu-I lation as well as for the highest figure of Christian emigration of whom Palestine had lost thus far. 61% of its Armenian Orthodox,50% of its Assyrian Orthodox and 28% of its Roman Catholic Christians.

Therefore, one of the most important challenges for Holy Family Hospital is also to find support for young Christians by providing training and job opportunities as well as providing family, women and child health care.

Let us not forget the Muslim community who celebrated a few days ago the beginning of Ramadan and are suffering from the same bad economic and political situation.


