EDITORIAL

H., a two-year old girl, born to an 18-year old mother in a Bethlehem maternity home, suffered during her birth from a shortage of oxygen leading to a cerebral palsy. This 18-year young mother will have to take care all her life of a handicapped child because her delivery took place under non-standard conditions. What makes the situation even worse is that the great majority of doctors in Palestine are not legally obliged to have a malpractice insurance, in contrast with doctors employed by NGO's ,who are obliged by law to have such an insurance. Consequently, the parents of this girl themselves have to take care of the future of their handicapped child.

Unfortunately this mother now in the 26 week of pregnancy, is hospitalized in our hospital because she had a premature rupture of membranes. We are trying to postpone her delivery as much as possible, under the best of circumstances she will deliver a viable premature baby, who will stay in our NICU for several weeks.

Last week we got two ladies for a Cesarean section delivery from a governmental hospital because at this hospital there was a lack of oxygen.

These are trite cases which we are seeing dozens of times in our hospital yearly. Although in the last months there was a huge improvement in the equipment of many neonatal departments in Palestine, the most important issue by far had not been considered as it should have been, by training nurses and doctors in order to properly take care of infants especially



the very tiny premature babies with a birth weight below 1000grs. Hiring specialized nurses and doctors in neonatology and putting in place an appropriate social security system are the two main issues which should be addressed immediately by the Palestinian Ministry of Health in the next years. High qualified staff should always be given priority over equipment and not the contrary.HFH contributes to this target by accepting six resident doctors mainly from governmental hospitals and also nurses who are following a postgraduate diploma in neonatology at Bethlehem University and Nablus Nursing School in order to be trained properly.

Because of shortage of well-trained nurses and doctors in Palestine, our neonatology team is overloaded with work. All difficult cases, not only from Bethlehem district but also from Hebron and sometimes from Ramallah, are being sent to Holy Family Hospital. Our statistics show that for the months of June and July we had an occupancy rate of 97%; this is unsustainable not only medically but also financially. I hesitate to imagine what would happen if we were obliged to close our unit for some medical reasons like infections....how many babies would die? We need urgently a better financial support of either the Palestinian Authorities or from International Organizations like the World Bank or UNRWA to help us to cover the running costs of this Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.
